The prize committee distinguished Salman Rushdie's perceptive political narrative, *Midnight's Children*, by awarding it "Booker of Bookers" in 1993 after having won the Booker prize in 1981. Ian McEwan's 1998 winner, *Amsterdam*, and Graham Swift's 1996 winner, *Last Orders*, are candid appraisals of the soul, which explore mortality and individuals' varied responses to death. Many Booker Prize winners have inspired internationally successful films. The lucid narratives of *Oscar and Lucinda* by Peter Carey and *The English Patient* by Michael Ondaatje, winners in 1990 and 1992 respectively, both present fascinating portraits of humanity which is a fundamental element of

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effective literature.

(1) The Great Gatsby, by F.Scott Fitzgerald, depicts the hopes of America's rich and leisured class and the lack of purpose in their lives that he witnessed. The American Dream was a kind of romantic expectation, a belief in the possibility of achievement through hard work and sincere devotion. However, the main purpose of the novel is to expose the corruption of the American Dream into the moral wasteland where impulse and appetite replace moral code and spiritual value. Gatsby attained the material part of the dream but the spiritual union he craved with Daisy was not to eventuate. (2) Her insufficient spirit and Gatsby's misunderstanding represent the fate of America in a materialistic age. It is this age that inspires and destroys Gatsby.

This text contains a number of errors. Clearly circle and correct each mistake.

The intermediate years of primary school are an important part of a child's reading development. We at this stage that children begin to transfer from a reliance on picture and text to a reliance on text alone for meaning. At this point, anildren's ability to select books according to their reading needs and interests is also developed. The role of teachers librarians and parents is crucial in supporting, but not determining these choices. (12 errors)

Most critics and authors agree that writing for this group is not easy. Many laudable attempts to write short, manageable texts for readers not yet entirely independent often result in simplistic narratives. In the beginning, authors may choose to take the cavice of author of forty years, Arnold Lobel. Who asserts that "writers need to practise separating the details of character, plot, setting and mood."

**Literature** and the demands of **its** readers are not always simple to address. To construct a narrative which is well **received** by teenagers in the increasingly complex world of the 1990's is difficult. To **satisfy** also the expectations of **parents**, for whom the subject matter of their child's book is important, is just as difficult. **(6 errors)**
